Message from the QMS Archivist



Change is not only an inevitable and inescapable part of life, but also very much part of the work of an archivist. In 2017, Queen Margaret's School made a strategic change by agreeing to create a facility to house the archives at the school. As part of this decision, there was a shift in attitude towards the historic records of the School.

The historical records were, until 2017, the de facto responsibility of OOMA who had a room in the basement of the residence. This room was, when I came onboard, bursting and bug infested. The task ahead—daunting and exciting.

In October 2018, Queen Margaret's School gave the Archives a semi-permanent home in the renovated maintenance building. This transformation was a huge step forward towards centennial planning and the integration of archives into the curriculum.

This new space evolved to become a place of gathering and learning. The Archives welcomed alumnae, students, and other visitors between 2018 and 2021. The QMS Archives was growing and donations from alumnae and staff as well as from members of the local community were steady.

In 2019, I was so pleased to be asked to be part of a project for the first class of Grade 8 boys where we took an in-depth look at the life of former QMS student, Major Charles Ferguson Hoey VC, MC (1914–1944). This project, under the guidance of faculty member Danika Farrugia, brought the potential for the Archives to be used as a tool for teachers into the spotlight.

Change came again when we moved the Archives to its current space in the summer of 2021—this time into the 1990s addition to the rear of the Head's House (631 Brownsey Ave). This space, while not perfect for an archives, is certainly the nicest space I have ever worked in; with two large rooms, one for storage and one for gathering and working, there is lots of light, air and even a fireplace!

For the past two years, there has been an increase in interest from staff wanting to incorporate the use of archival records and primary source research into student projects. This is such an exciting and rewarding opportunity for me to share my knowledge and expertise with the next generation. The students (and staff) are amazed that this facility exists and students have done some incredible work as a result.

A few weeks ago, I think I may have made professional archival history when I introduced archives to the Grade 1 class at the request of their teacher, Heather Andrews. We talked about some of the animals who had lived on campus, and I was able to read to them a story that Miss Geoghegan had written about Edward the cat in 1950. We talked about caring for old paper and looked at some old photographs. A great-grandmother of one of the young student's had attended QMS in the 1940s, and also wrote the School Prayer, which I was able to show them.

Change, flexibility, and creativity keep the QMS Archives growing and relevant in the ever-changing milieu of school life. Archives, and the historical records that they hold, are not just old, lifeless records neatly arranged and stored, but are a living, ever growing legacy of a community whose spirit and steadfastness brought learning to students. The story was begun by the Founders and must be continued by us.

Message from the QMS Equestrian Centre



It is commonly known that people fear change. Maybe not the kind of change that is brought about voluntarily in their own lives, but certainly a healthy concern for the kind of change caused by others.

Consider the following situations: your neighbour puts up a large fence made out of cheap construction materials, a local stand of trees is cut down to accommodate development, your work swaps out premium coffee for a cheaper (and far less tasty) alternative, your boss tells you the company has hired someone new above you who you will now be reporting to. How many of these situations would you naturally and comfortably 'embrace'?

The truth is, there are two sides to change. There is the side viewed from the initiator's perspective—generally welcomed or perceived as improvement—and the side viewed by those imposed upon. This side of change is far less appealing and the side that often strikes the fear of change in those impacted.

The key to embracing change starts with acceptance, for without it there would be no evolution, no progression, no innovation. By accepting that the only constant in life is change (a true oxymoron if ever there was one), we can begin to regain the sense of control we feel has been lost when change is thrust upon us.

Being a party to the change can help accelerate our level of acceptance—and comfort—with it. There are many "Change Management Professionals" who specialize in bringing the two sides of change together to make transition easier for all parties. These specialists act as a type of mediator; they strategically introduce the change to those impacted and solicit constructive feedback. This helps all parties feel valued as an integral part of the process, in turn encouraging buy-in and speeding up acceptance.

So, if you find yourself initiating change, take the time to communicate the change to relevant stakeholders and be prepared to listen. And if you find yourself being impacted by change, seek out the initiator and ask if there's anything you can do to help structure the change. You may just find your input will create something you can embrace.
